ARTISTIC DIRECTOR'S WELCOME



HELEN ZUKERMAN

ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

As we enter our third decade, it is important to reflect on the history of our Festival and the changing nature of film-going in general.

When we started TJFF, Jewish content films seldom played in a multiplex; *Schindler's List* and *Sophie's Choice* were rare exceptions. Now, it is more common to have Jewish content films opening theatrically. Israeli films have been greeted with much acclaim by international audiences, probably due to their artistic evolution over the past twenty years.

Jon Stewart reclaimed the word "Jewy" for all of us by saying "it's IN to be Jewy." Nobody has embraced this more than TJFF, as we have attempted to broaden the definition of "a Jewish film". When trying to define it, we usually say "I know it when I see it". Films have helped change many people's image of Jews: We are not just black hats, kippot, long skirts, hair coverings and wigs, but also nose rings and tattoos. In our films, we live everywhere, do everything, and are usually unrecognizable from the rest of the population.

From our very first Festival, our mission was to create a film-viewing experience so special that you had to be there. To miss it was to miss something magical.

Our first film ever shown (*Black to the Promised Land*) followed a group of inner city New York kids to a kibbutz in Israel, and chronicled the culture shock between the kids and the kibbutz members. All 800 seats of the Bloor were filled many times over with an enthusiastic crowd.

Twenty years ago, we played *Chicks in White Satin*, a story about a lesbian wedding with each partner wanting to wear a white wedding dress. The response to this film was ahead of its time; our audience felt they had a new understanding of the universal nature of love.

Over the years, we have invited guests as diverse as a Jordanian journalist, a male escort from Amsterdam,

heroes who saved Jewish lives, an Israeli settler police officer and the original "Happy Hooker," Xaviera Hollander.

Every Festival has its unplanned magical moments, such as when two Holocaust survivors met up in our lobby for the first time in 60 years, after sharing a bunk in the same camp. And how could we forget the Russian woman who took off her blouse while watching a film because she was too hot? Unfortunately she forgot to put it back on before exiting the theatre. How about when Schwartz's smoked meat sandwiches were cut fresh outside the Boor Cinema?

We have had films from places as far away as Iceland, Norway, Ireland and Mongolia. This year we had over 500 films submitted: who would have thought that so many Jewish content films are being made throughout the world. Always a wonder!

In addition to entertaining, delighting and provoking discussion, we also aim to create special experiences. To miss them would be a shame.

Our Opening Night film, co-presented with ImagineNative Film + Media Arts Festival, will be a once in a lifetime event. The *Shalom Bollywood* programme is a chance to learn about Jewish involvement in the Cinema of India. To forego these opportunities to engage with the Aboriginal and Indian communities in this city would be a missed opportunity.

In my day, we lusted after the biggest TV screen possible. Today, I see my grandchildren enjoying films on a 2 x 3 inch iPod. How strange! Watching movies has become more of a solitary experience than it used to be. But for 11 days this April, put down your smartphone and tablet, turn off the On Demand feature on your cable and get yourself down to the Festival. Celebrate going to the movies as it used to be—"Hava Nagila" (rejoice) yourselves until you can rejoice no longer!

Movie-going has changed, but the magical, larger-thanlife communal spirit of a Festival has never changed.

PROGRAMME MANAGER'S NOTE



STUART HANDS

PROGRAMME MANAGER

I have been working at the Toronto Jewish Film Festival since 2006. Prior to that I studied Jewish identity in film and television. In doing so, I discovered many Jewish screen artists who provided alternative role models to the traditional gender expectations I grew up with. These discoveries helped inform me as a Jew and as an individual. I pursued this subject as I completed my Masters degree in film studies, writing my thesis on the Hollywood star image of 1940s Jewish actor John Garfield.

Four particular programmes from this year's Festival speak to this interest of mine.

I must first mention the British reality series, *Jewish Mum of the Year*, which is very compelling and funny, while offering great insight into the contradictory expectations of the "Jewish Mother."

Second, one of the most enchanting screen performances at this year's Festival comes from Israeli actress Rotem Zisman-Cohen. In *God's Neighbors*, she possesses a sweetness and vulnerability. At the same time, she expresses a strong self-determination that serves both as a perfect foil to the hubris of the young gang she confronts, and a spiritual anchor for the painfully confused central character of the film. Third, there's the 1997 Israeli dark comedy *Skin Deep*, which is being screened as part of a programme devoted to Israeli writer and director Etgar Keret. Co-directed by Ran Tal (*Children of the Sun*), who is one of my favourite filmmakers working today, *Skin Deep* is a charming and bittersweet satire on Israeli machismo.

Fourth, in the 1959 TV version of *The Jazz Singer*, Jerry Lewis proves to be the only actor, other than Al Jolson, who movingly and convincingly conveys the fragmented identity of the American Jewish son in this oft-told story. Like Al Jolson, Jerry Lewis is never afraid to transgress acceptable norms of male behavior in his films. The ability of Lewis' screen image to transcend gender and broader social expectations is explored in *Jerry and Me*, a 38-minute film that is being played on the same bill as *The Jazz Singer*.

It is discoveries such as these that make me value my experience with the Toronto Jewish Film Festival. It is an honour for me to work on this emotionally and intellectually stimulating 11-day event, and I am extremely grateful for the opportunity.

PROGRAMMERS' NOTES



JÉRÉMIE ABESSIRA

I am originally from France, now live in Toronto, and explore the world through films. I've worked for five film festivals, and programmed for three of them-Cinefranco, The International Francophone Film Festival of Toronto; The Toronto Italian Contemporary Film Festival and Un poing c'est court. a short film festival in France. I've always been fascinated by Israeli society, culture and identity, and it's a real honour for me to be part of the Toronto Jewish Film Festival family. I'm in constant search for anything coming out of Israel, especially in music and cinema. The Festival provides a real opportunity to watch the best in recent Israeli cinema, revealing the diversity of genres and styles.

I've been happily surprised by *Cats* on a Pedal Boat and Poisoned, which both bring fresh air to the Israeli cinema thanks to the young talented directors who are exploring the Horror genre with taste and humour. For me, *God's Neighbors* is definitely one of the best Israeli films of 2012 with its great performances and critical and challenging take on Israeli society. And finally, it's worth mentioning the incredible performance of Sasson Gabai (*The Band's Visit*) in a film that will make you laugh, even by its title alone—*When Pigs Have Wings*.

PHYLLIS ANGEL GREENBERG

In my first year as a programmer it has been exciting to discover the range of films that are submitted from all over the world to our Festival. It has been energizing to discuss and examine the films with such a passionate and knowledgeable group who treated this newbie with generosity.

In making my decisions, I have relied on my background in music and literature and my knowledge and experience of Jewish practice, particularly regarding women's roles. I am fascinated by relationships, how they form, how they are perceived by the participants and how they are sustained or destroyed. The theme of "character as destiny" is a constant in reality and in fiction, in documentaries and in features.

I particularly liked three unusual love stories: *The Ballad of the Weeping Spring*, in which music itself is a main character in the narrative; *Epilogue*, with its touching understatement and subtle truth; and *Second Movement for Piano and Needlework*, in which the cinematography and the music are participants in the relationship dance.



ALLEN BRAUDE

Having programmed for a variety of film festivals—from festivals for children to one focused on breast cancer awareness—I have encountered a wide range of films. Among the joys of programming with TJFF (in addition to working with a great group of people) is the diversity in both content and form of Jewish films to choose from, and my eclectic tastes lead me to champion everything from big budget narratives to meditative experimental pieces.

Ultimately, I am most drawn to films that are in some way unique and offer something different or unexpected. I really enjoyed the clever use of thumbprints to provide individuality to the nameless concentration camp prisoners in the beautiful short animation Audition. I was captivated by the wonderful photography of Numbered which distinguished it from many other worthy Holocaust documentaries. I was fascinated by how Hunting Time cleverly connected seemingly disparate elements. I was wowed by the weaving together of archival footage with the artists' own words, providing surprising warmth and intimacy to the biography of an 'enfant terrible' in *Gainsbourg By* Gainsbourg. And there's the freshness and honesty, not to mention the outstanding acting and storytelling of Aya, my favourite narrative film in the Festival. Oh yeah, I also love to laugh and there's a hilarious comedy shorts program not to be missed. Enjoy!



RANI SANDERSON

I was very excited to see the many movies about children in this year's line-up. I have always loved children's stories, and I am lucky to work as an arts educator for children, specializing in digital storytelling and creative writing programs. Naturally, I am drawn to films about children and the magic of childhood, particularly those told through the eyes of the child, namely, *The Dandelions, My Best Holidays, Kosher* and *Blue Line*.

As a video artist and digital storytelling facilitator, I also love watching works rooted in personal narrative and created by filmmakers who clearly appreciate the art of cinema, and illustrate their stories with thoughtful and beautiful visuals. On this note, I must single out *Aya* and *Nyosha*, as well as the biographical documentary about the amazing, trailblazing artist, *Altina*, and her remarkable 1960 Oscar®-nominated short film, *Interregnum*.



SUSAN STARKMAN

My interest in Israeli film dates back to the early 1980s when I spent two and a half years at Hebrew University. Israeli cinema has come a long way in the last 30 years and film has been as important as newspapers to me in keeping up with the political and social changes that have occurred in the last three decades. One of the films that I think best reflects how far removed Israel has become from the socialist ideals of its early pioneers is Amir Manor's Epilogue. Often described as the Israeli version of Amour because it depicts an aging couple dealing with illness and death, *Epilogue* is nevertheless firmly rooted in a specific Israeli context. For Berl and Hayuta, poor health is secondary to the erosion of community values that were the cornerstone of their generation. It is not their age that makes this couple irrelevant to society, but rather their obsolete ideology based on writers whose works Berl can't even sell to a used bookstore. Idan Hubel's The Cutoff Man offers a similar critique of Israeli society. In order to save himself from destitution, Gaby reluctantly takes a job cutting off the water supply of people who have not paid their bills. In so doing, he becomes an agent of a heartless bureaucracy and the target of rage for those who have fallen victim to it. Together, these films are emblematic of the collective frustration that has recently seen Israelis take to the streets demanding social justice.

Film. It's what Jews do best.

Jews have a reputation for making great cinema: Spielberg, Cronenberg, Katzenberg (and these are merely the tip of the Bergs). Truth is, many of vour favourite films have a Jewish connection. DAVID A. STEIN MEMORIAL AWARD



DAVID A. STEIN

(1970-2004)

The David A. Stein Memorial Award is presented in memory of a gifted Toronto filmmaker who passed away in 2004 at age 34. The "Tzimmie"—named after his production company, Tzimmes Entertainment—is an annual \$5,000 award to the director of the best documentary making its Canadian premiere at the Toronto Jewish Film Festival, and supports documentary filmmakers in creating works that would have interested David, and that carry on his passion for storytelling.

Largely self-taught, David began his film career in 1993, first as a production manager and later as writer, director and editor of short films, as well as corporate identity and music videos. He made his first documentary—*Toward a Just Society*, a study of race relations in Canada—in 1998 for the Canadian Council of Christians and Jews. David also worked on television's *Betrayal* series, where he strived to give meaning to the stories of Mordechai Vanunu and Jonathan Pollard.

David worked closely with the TJFF, producing comedic trailers that also reflected his understanding of the human condition. In many ways the TJFF was a second home for him, with his love of film and Yiddishkeit.

As we celebrate our 21st Festival, we remember those people who made us great. David was certainly one of them.

She also hosts *Wachtel on the Arts*, which features conversations with filmmakers, composers, architects, artists, etc., and for 12 years, she hosted *The Arts Tonight*. Wachtel has received many honours for her contributions to Canadian cultural life, including eight honorary degrees and the Order of Canada.

This is an exciting year for FilmMatters as we welcome the Azrieli Foundation as the sponsor of our in-theatre programme during the Festival. Early in March, we held a teachers' screening of short films produced by the Azrieli Foundation and inspired by their award-winning memoirs of Holocaust survivors. These shorts combine first person accounts with exquisitely animated excerpts from the authors' memoir. We are looking forward to sharing these films with a student audience during the Festival. Judy Abrams, author of the memoir *Tenuous Threads* on which one of the films is based, will be in attendance for a Q&A after the screening.

As part of our in-school programme sponsored by the Ontario Trillium Foundation, FilmMatters hosted five screenings of the film *Louder Than A Bomb* in priority area schools in December 2012. Director Greg Jacobs and Nate Marshall, one of the slam poets featured in the film, were our invited guests. Over 850 students took part in the program and the response was so overwhelming that we have decided to bring both the film and Nate back for a repeat screening during the Festival.

Rounding out the high school Festival programme is 400 Miles to Freedom, a fascinating look at Jews from African, Asian and Latino backgrounds. Using his own experience as an Ethiopian "falasha" (outsider) as a springboard, director Avishai Yeganyahu Mekonen explores other Jewish minority groups, revealing a rich tapestry of the Jewish experience across the globe.

For primary school students, the film *The Zig Zag Kid* is an action packed coming-of-age film based on the acclaimed children's book by David Grossman. Students and teachers alike will delight in Nono's escapades as this film appeals to the child in all of us.







HILLEL SPOTLIGHT ON ISRAELI FILM

For the third year, the Toronto Jewish Film Festival is partnering with Hillel of Greater Toronto for a screening series that attempts to shed some light on Israeli culture, society and day-to-day life. This two-evening event also emphasizes the state of Israeli filmmaking today by showing works of both film students and seasoned directors.
