

ARTISTIC DIRECTOR'S WELCOME

ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Over the years, TJFF has been fortunate to work with various advertising agencies who have offered to design pro-bono marketing campaigns to help us get our message out to the public and attract new audiences to the Festival.

They produce these campaigns out of generosity and a desire to share their creativity. As a result, many marketing contests and honours have been won over the years for TJFF campaigns.

This is a relationship where everyone benefits. We get a campaign worth many thousands of dollars that we could not afford to produce on our own, while the agencies end up with award-winning additions to their portfolios.

This year, when Debbie Werner, our executive director, and I went to the first meeting with our new ad agency (FCB), we were asked by their chief creative officer, Jon Flannery, "Why do you do this? Why do you continue to run the Toronto Jewish Film Festival?"

In all the years I had sat in 'first meetings' at new agencies, no one had ever asked us that question.

I mumbled something like –"for the love of film," or "we show films that often do not get commercial releases so they wouldn't be seen otherwise" or "it keeps me out of trouble."

But the question stayed with me for a few days.

Finally, I thought more deeply about my answer and e-mailed Flannery. This is what I told him:

"TJFF is a window to and a mirror of the Jewish experience around the world."

The Jewish world goes beyond Bathurst Street and it's important that the Toronto community see that. Being Jewish in Toronto is different than it is in Uruguay or Poland

or in any one of the 18 countries that are represented in this year's Festival.

It is important to share our history as well as our present-day existence.

So for the Jewish community, it is an opportunity to see what being Jewish meant yesterday as well as what it means today in the wider world.

For non-Jews, it's important to show our many faces. For some people, the image of the Jew is a male wearing a black hat, who has side curls and a big nose. We challenge that image and demand to not just be seen as a stereotype.

It is important to be recognized as individuals who happen to belong to a particular culture; it could only be a good thing to share our experiences with others in a city as culturally diverse as Toronto.

I asked Flannery why he had asked his initial question.

His reply –"Somebody once asked me that question, and now every once in a while I'll meet people who seem really passionate and committed to what they do for a job, and I'm curious to know what drives them."

This passion and commitment is shared by all the TJFF programmers, as we discuss the over 500 films that we preview and consider for the Festival.

Often, there are animated, yet respectful arguments about the merits of particular films, but one thing we all agree on is that we are still learning about the Jewish experience around the world.

So, along with all of the above, I need to say that after all these years, on Opening Night, when the lights go down, it is still Magic! And it DOES keep us all out of trouble!

PROGRAMME DIRECTOR'S NOTE



STUART HANDS

PROGRAMME DIRECTOR

2015 marks my tenth year working at the Festival.

In my first year with the Festival, I worked as a freelance programmer, and assisted in putting together the Festival's first sidebar series, 'Rhythm and Jews', which examined Black-Jewish relations in America through the prism of popular music. Since then, these specialty series have become an important staple of the Festival. They are now a significant forum for asking the million-dollar question, "What is a Jewish film?," as they have looked at how an artist's Jewish roots and upbringing are expressed in secular culture. As Yiddishkeit scholar Paul Buhle—who has spoken at the Festival several times—affirmed, this sort of Jewish-informed popular culture becomes a vital source of Jewish continuity.

On this note, we are honouring two artists whose 'pintele yid' (Jewish spark) has made a lasting impact on popular culture: writer Rod Serling—of *Twilight Zone* fame—and Canadian icon AI Waxman. Both in their own way created work that speaks—directly or indirectly—to being a Jew in the modern world.

During my years as a programmer here, I have been introduced to the work of numerous filmmakers with immense talent and singularity of vision. This year's Festival sees the return of several of these original voices, as they share their newest work. Sam Ball (*Pleasures of Urban Decay*) offers us his short film *People of the Graphic Novel* about the Jewish contribution to the American comic book industry. Nadav Lapid (*Policeman*) returns with his internationally-acclaimed *The Kindergarten Teacher*. Aviva Kempner (*Yoo-Hoo Mrs Goldberg*) presents another little-known but significant piece of Jewish Americana with *Rosenwald*. Gayle Kirschenbaum follows up her short film *My Nose* with her hilarious and immensely touching personal documentary, *Look at us Now, Mother*. Our 1995 Festival featured the Israeli classic, *Sh'chur*—a benchmark in Israeli cinema's depiction of the country's Moroccan community—starring and written by Hanna Azouly Hasfari. This year, we present her remarkable and visually-stunning directorial debut, *Orange People*.

An exciting discovery for me is the filmmaking team of Shaul Betser and Asaf Galay, who have created two unique looks at Jewish culture, *The Muses of Bashevis Singer* and *Hebrew Superheroes*. I also look forward to seeing future films by Jordan Stone, the filmmaker of this year's *Irwin and Fran*. I hope people are as excited as I am by the opportunity that Stone provides to discover (or rediscover) the iconoclastic comic, "Professor" Irwin Corey.

One of the most remarkable changes I have seen over the last few years is the growth of Israeli narrative feature films directed by women. When I started working here, there were documentaries made by women. There were also exceptional student films made by women, but most often those directors didn't go on to make bigger films. As in most film industries around the world, the domain of narrative features remained almost exclusively male (with a few exceptions such as Ronit Elkabetz and Michal Bat-Adam). I remember talking two years ago with filmmaker Rony Angel Sasson when she was here with her magnificent mediumlength drama, *Wherever You Go*, and she told me that I would see some big changes happening very soon in terms of women-directed features.

I am delighted to announce that our 2015 Festival presents five new bold Israeli feature films directed or co-directed by women—*Orange People, Encirclements, Self-Made, Valley* and *The Farewell Party.* I look forward to seeing where this shift is going, and reading future scholarship on how it is affecting Israeli cinema as a whole.

PROGRAMMERS' NOTES



JÉRÉMIE ABESSIRA

I've been lucky to be part of the TJFF team for the past few years, leading me to discover new gems of cinema from around the world. I truly believe that this year's diverse programme has something for everyone to connect with.

I usually define myself as a French Liberal Zionist Sephardic Jew living in Canada. This year's films give me the opportunity to fully explore each part of my identity. An Untold Diplomatic History is probably the best documentary ever done on the relationship between France and Israel, a very timely subject, which brings some context to the recent tragedy surrounding Charlie Hebdo. Orange People, a beautiful and colourful tale of Moroccan life in Israel today, offers a unique depiction of Sephardic culture. I get to challenge my own definition of Zionism with the powerful documentary The Zionist Idea and its reflection on 67 years of shared ideals. Shirel Amitay's Atlit is a more personal approach to modern Zionism, even more relevant to me with the film's characters torn between the country they cherish and the country they reside in.

I'm also excited that we are showcasing some Israeli "pop culture": *Lemon Popsicle*, the Israeli cult film (remade in the US as *The Last American Virgin*, which is also screening). The documentary *Hebrew Superheroes* takes us through the history of Israeli comics. Finally, Israeli cinema has never exploited the thriller genre as well as it does in the suspenseful *Suicide* and the original TV series *Hostages*.



ALLEN BRAUDE

I thoroughly enjoy being part of the TJFF programming team. Every year I look forward to the excitement that comes from seeing great films and helping to bring them to the Festival's audiences (which more than compensates for watching the not-so-good ones).

Of this year's wonderful and diverse slate, three films made an extra strong impression. *Next To Her* is part of a recent crop of honest films about difficult subjects coming out of Israel. Featuring outstanding performances, this story of a woman struggling to care for her intellectually disabled sister is refreshingly unsentimental and more powerful because of that.

Shoah, The Forgotten Souls of History is a challenging but truly rewarding documentary. The footage of the Shoah is raw and unflinching but this intelligent look at how Soviet Russia erased the Jewish identity of the victims is eye-opening.

I feel it is enriching for children and teenagers to see films from around the world and *Secrets Of War* from the Netherlands is an excellent film for audiences 10 and up. Part of its strength comes from making its story about war understandable and relatable to younger audiences without diminishing its seriousness.

Please don't think I am only impressed by 'serious' films. The very funny *You Must Be Joking* contains my favourite line in any film this year. I'd tell you what it is, but it's not fit for print. Enjoy the Festival!



MAOR OZ

As per most years, I have been stricken with pleasant surprise by how much one can learn through film. So much exists beyond what we know, and this year we have the pleasure of exposing the Toronto community to rarely-told stories. Having won wide recognition from around the world, Do You Believe in Love? tells the story of seemingly cynical matchmaker Tova. Paralysed and confined to her apartment, she works with some of the most challenging cases to help them find love. Conversely, The Dove Flyer tells of the Baghdadi (and ultimately, Iraqi) Jewish community's violent and untimely uprooting from their beloved homeland, only to be transplanted in Israel and elsewhere where decades of misunderstanding would await them. What We Left Behind tells of the fragmented pieces of the Iraqi community that were left and the beautiful reunion they have after the American invasion of Baghdad. It is with great excitement that I welcome you to a diverse and inspiring 2015 Festival!



RANI SANDERSON

I'm interested in how places hold histories. So I am drawn to the ways art can reveal those memories when so many of these places are vanishing. How can we capture their stories so that they live beyond the place that they were originally connected to? Whether it's through The *Anarchist Rabbi*'s depiction of the ever-changing London, the archival footage used in *Shoah, The Forgotten Souls of History,* or *Famous Nathan*'s examining of the American Dream, this year's Festival has films that deal with the subject of change, loss and preservation.

One of my favourite films this year is the short, 70 Hester Street, which takes us through the amazing story of a building in New York's Lower East Side. It uncovers a vital history of both the filmmaker's family and the neighbourhood, now on the brink of being lost to corporate condos and chain coffee shops. Then there are the artists depicted in Because I was a Painter, who find exquisite ways not only to confront and express the horrors they witnessed in the concentration camps, but also to preserve their culture. Similarly, the architects and artists in the incredible Raise the Roof resurrect part of an old wooden synagogue from 17th century Poland; as they say in the film, "it's not recovering an object, it's recovering a world." Film has the power to preserve these worlds, which is what forever draws me to the stories told through cinema



SUSAN STARKMAN

In the wake of the January terrorist attacks in Paris, the French education system has come under scrutiny, placing teachers at the forefront of an establishment responsible not only for delivering academic subjects, but also for instilling the moral principles fundamental to French society: liberté, égalité, fraternité. Accordingly, the Education Minister announced a €250 million initiative to train teachers in delivering anti-racism education. It is in this context that the film *Once In a Lifetime* takes on an important new dimension, resonating with me, a former teacher.

Set in a working class suburb with a large Muslim population, the film is based on the true story of Anne Angles, a teacher determined to see her disaffected students achieve academic success beyond the decidedly low expectations of the school administration. To that end, Angles enters her class in the National Contest of Resistance and Deportation, requiring them to submit a piece about children under the Nazi regime. Initially reluctant, her students gradually make connections between their experiences and those of the young people persecuted by Nazis. Overcoming their prejudices, the class commits itself wholeheartedly to the competition. The result is a testament to the ability of a single teacher to make a meaningful difference even when the administration charged with nurturing its students has abandoned them.

Also proving to be eerily timely, *Cartoonists: Foot Soldiers of Democracy* is must-see viewing for everyone interested in the free speech debate ignited by the Paris attacks.

STUDENT FELLOWSHIP



STUDENT EDUCATION OUTREACH

One of the most difficult tasks for teachers of younger students is introducing them to the subject of war. While many of the films in the FilmMatters programme relate to the Holocaust, it is difficult to find appropriate films for younger audiences that broach the subject without overwhelming them. This year, two of the films in our student programme deal with WWII in a manner that offers teachers an entry point to discussing such dark material.

For his film adaptation of *Belle and Sebastian*, director Nicolas Vanier has reset it to 1943 in a remote village in the French Alps. Young Sebastian lives with his adopted grandfather and aunt. The tranquillity of the town is threatened with the arrival of the Nazis charged with capturing the Resistance fighters who have been secretly smuggling Jewish refugees to Switzerland. Soon Sebastian has a secret of his own, a wild dog that he shelters. When the grandfather is injured, Sebastian and his dog are recruited to help smuggle the refugees. Without explicitly addressing the atrocities from which the Jews are escaping, the film focuses on acts of bravery and moral courage in the face of danger.

Secrets of War not only explores WWII through the eyes of children but also alludes to the fate that awaited the Jews. Tuur and Lambert are best friends living in a Dutch town whose friendship is tested with the arrival in town of Maartje, as both boys vie for her affection. This sets off a dangerous chain of events that culminate in Maartje and the family protecting her, being arrested by the Nazis. What happens to them is never stated, but it provides a springboard for teachers to discuss what will inevitably occur.

Finally, *Once in a Lifetime* addresses the Holocaust through the perspective of contemporary teenagers living in a working class suburb of Paris. Self-absorbed and angry at a society that discriminates against minorities, it is only when their history teacher enters them in a national competition about children in the Holocaust that they start to realise that their experiences are not unique.
